KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Paul Franks, University of Toronto

Paul Franks holds the Senator Jeremiah S. and Carole S. Grafstein Chair in Jewish Philosophy. He has taught at the University of Michigan (Ann Arbor (1993-1996), Indiana University Bloomington (1996-2000), the University of Notre Dame (2000-2004), and the University of Chicago (Spring 2003). His research interests include: Jewish philosophy, Kant, German idealism, post-Kantian approaches within analytic and continental philosophy, transcendental arguments, metaphysics and epistemology, and the foundations of the human sciences. He has been Brackenbury Scholar at Balliol College, Oxford; Lady Davis Graduate Research Fellow at the Hebrew University; Mrs. Giles F. Whiting Dissertation Fellow in the Humanities at Harvard University; Junior Fellow of the Michigan Society of Fellows; and Fellow of the American Council of Learned Societies.

Robert Brandom, University of Pittsburgh

Robert Brandom is the Distinguished Service Professor of Philosophy, a fellow of the Center for the Philosophy of Science, and a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. His interests center on philosophy of language, philosophy of mind, and the philosophy of logic. He has published more than 50 articles on these and related areas. He is currently at work on a book on Hegel's Phenomenology. He has been a Nelson Visiting Professor at the University of Michigan (1990), delivered the Hempel Lectures at Princeton (1994), and the Townsend Lectures at Berkeley (1997).

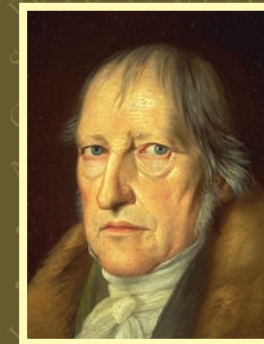
